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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On April 15, 2024, the 2024 Kentucky General Assembly adjourned Sine Die. Concluding its 60-day "Long or Budget Year" session. Lawmakers will reconvene for the 2025 Legislative Session at 12 p.m. EST on January 7, 2025.

The 2024 Legislative session started slowly, but a flurry of activity in the second half saw the filing of over 1,200 bills—the highest in over two decades. Approximately 215 bills were passed before the session's end, with over two dozen receiving votes on the final day.

At the beginning of the session, two House of Representatives seats became vacant. Former House Economic Development Chairman Russell Webber (R-Shepherdsville) left to become Deputy State Treasurer under Treasurer Mark Metcalf. Similarly, former Vice Chairman of House Appropriations and Revenue Brandon Reed (R-Hodgenville) resigned to join Agriculture Commissioner Jonathan Shell's administration as Executive Director of the Kentucky Office of Agricultural Policy.

Debates ranged across various topics, including education, housing, elections, firearms, autonomous vehicles, and even the designation of the official state rock. Big data, artificial intelligence, DEI, and the future of nuclear energy in Kentucky were also hotly debated issues.

As the **Voice of Kentucky's Commercial Construction Industry**, it is incumbent upon us to provide a comprehensive analysis of the legislation that will soon become law in the Commonwealth. By all accounts, our legislature has committed through action to investing in **infrastructure**, **economic development**, and **career and technical education** to construct a better Kentucky.

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CONSTRUCTION / ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT RELATED LEGISLATION PASSED

Career and Technical Education Funding (McCool, R-Van Lear): [HB 499](#) directs the Office of Career and Technical Education within Kentucky Department of Education to categorize programs as high or general cost. Allocate funding for career and technical education from the general fund, based on enrollment and incentives. Fund state-operated area technology centers and allow use of funds for grades 5-8 programs.

Civil Procedure (Elliott, R-Danville): [HB 320](#) reduced the current five-year limit to three-years, providing uniformity with existing federal standards for certain civil actions, including wrongful discharge claims against employers and violations of KRS 337.385. It also amends regulations regarding unpaid wages and overtime compensation, allowing for additional damages and punitive measures for forced labor cases. It also clarifies the conditions for personal jurisdiction in civil actions in Kentucky courts.

Construction or Demolition Waste Disposal (Dixon, R-Corydon): [HB 478](#) permits an off-site construction or demolition waste disposal permit holder to apply for an expansion of the permitted area, up to a total of two acres. The applicant must meet all current permit requirements for the existing area and comply with all regulations for the new area, including posting an additional bond.

Economic Development (Neighbors, R-Edmonton): [HB 533](#) expands the use of bond sale proceeds to working capital expenses relating to some city and county projects.

Economic Relief for Local Communities (Heath, R-Mayfield): [HB723](#) makes modifications to the Government Resources Accelerating Need Transformation (GRANT) program and clarifies the Department of Local Government's role in administering the program. This ties into the \$400M located within HB 1.



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CONSTRUCTION / ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT RELATED LEGISLATION PASSED

Environmental Audits (Bauman, R-Louisville): HB 136 creates an environmental audit privilege, allowing facilities and activities regulated under Kentucky law to conduct voluntary internal environmental audits without fear of legal repercussions. It defines an environmental audit as a comprehensive evaluation to identify and prevent noncompliance with environmental regulations. The privilege protects audit reports from being used as evidence in civil or administrative proceedings, except under specific circumstances. It also outlines conditions for voluntary disclosure of violations, waiving penalties if violations are promptly corrected and certain criteria are met.

Environmental Emergencies (Lawrence, R-Maysville): HB 583 mandates a notification of an environmental emergency declaration to all local government chief executives and mayors within the jurisdiction.

Kentucky Housing Task Force (Bridges, R-Paducah): HCR 68 establishes the Kentucky Housing Task Force to study, review, and provide policy recommendations on how to address the housing shortage in the Kentucky. The task force will meet monthly during the 2024 interim.

Master Electrician Licensing (S. Bratcher, R-Elizabethtown): HB444 primarily shifts the standards for master electrician licensing from years to hours of verifiable experience, offering flexibility for training and degree programs. Establishes an electronic process for renewals that will transition from annual renewal to biannual.

Paid Family Leave Insurance (Heavrin, R-Leitchfield): HB 179 amends Kentucky insurance laws to include disability income insurance and voluntary paid family leave insurance under health and life insurance categories, respectively. It defines disability income insurance as periodic payments for disability resulting from sickness or injury and paid family leave insurance as coverage for income loss due to absences unrelated to disability. It establishes regulations for these insurances, including benefit periods, eligibility criteria, and coverage limitations. Additionally, it allows the commissioner to promulgate regulations to ensure compliance and effectiveness.



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CONSTRUCTION / ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT RELATED LEGISLATION PASSED

Residential Planned Communities (Freeland, R-Benton): HB 472 permits the appointment of a receiver for a planned community in case of failure to maintain essential facilities. This includes infrastructure, common areas, stormwater facilities, etc. Additionally, enable cities to recoup funds spent on rectifying code violations or conducting repairs and renovations.

School District Buildings (Meredith, Oakland): HB727 created a new section of KRS Chapter 162 which authorizes school districts to issue general obligation bonds and secure bank loans. General obligation bonds must be procured through advertising or competitive bidding, with provisions for the department to intercept funds for bond payments.

Strengthen Kentucky Homes (Pollock, R-Campbellville): HB256 establishes the Strengthen Kentucky Homes Program to provide grants for fortifying homes against catastrophic wind and hail events, following FORTIFIED construction standards. It creates a fund for program implementation and requires insurers to offer discounts for homes meeting these standards. It also mandates optional coverage for upgrading non-compliant single-family dwellings' roofs.

Workforce Attraction and Retention Task Force (Wise, R-Campbellville): SJR 176 Establishes a Workforce Attraction and Retention Task Force. The TF aims to gather leaders in economic development, tourism, education, and labor to study strategies for attracting and retaining skilled workers, essential for sustaining economic growth and addressing the workforce gap. The task force will meet monthly during the 2024 interim.



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PRIORITIES OF HOUSE LEADERSHIP

Education Constitutional Amendment (Miles, R-Owensboro): House Bill 2 seeks to amend the state constitution to allow financial support for education outside the public school system.

Human Trafficking (Miles, R-Owensboro): HB 3 expands the definition of promoting human trafficking, establishes a working group led by the Attorney General to study human trafficking, and mandates reporting on forced labor. Additionally, it requires the Cabinet for Health and Family Services to include human trafficking information in its annual report, mandates hotels, airports, passenger train stations, truck stops, and bus stations to display signs with assistance contact information, and establishes penalties for noncompliance, with funds directed to the human trafficking victims fund.

Safer Kentucky Act (Bauman, R-Louisville): House Bill 5 is a omnibus public safety package. This anti-crime bill enhances penalties for repeat violent offenders and addresses carjacking and street camping, among other provisions.

Autonomous Vehicles (Bray, R-Mount Vernon): House Bill 7 creates a regulatory framework for operating autonomous vehicles in Kentucky.

Nicotine Products (Raymer, R-Morgantown): HB 11 regulates tobacco product retailers. It requires the Secretary of State to publish a list of certain tobacco retailers and mandates the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control to maintain a tobacco noncompliance database. Wholesalers must verify retailer compliance before transactions and fines are imposed for unlawful sales. Retailers with unpaid fines cannot sell tobacco products until fines are paid, and manufacturers must provide safe harbor certification. The bill also prohibits retailers from selling tobacco products to persons under 21 and allows the board to conduct hearings and appeals.



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PRIORITIES OF SENATE LEADERSHIP

Endowed Research Fund (Stivers, R-Manchester): Senate Bill 1 creates an endowed research fund administered by the Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE). The fund aims to finance research consortiums between two or more public universities. It consists of appropriations, federal funds, and other proceeds, and does not lapse. Five consortium accounts are established within the fund, each assigned to a unique research consortium chosen by CPE. CPE will solicit, accept, and review applications from research consortiums to determine eligibility for seed funding over five years. Future eligibility for funding will be determined through a review process, and CPE will fill vacancies when a consortium is no longer eligible. Administrative regulations will be promulgated by CPE to administer this section, and the Kentucky Spinal Cord and Head Injury Research Trust will be selected as one of the initial five research consortiums by February 1, 2025.

Student Safety (Wise, R-Campbellsville): SB 2 establishes guidelines for employing Kentucky guardians in schools, specifying their qualifications and granting immunities similar to those of police officers. The bill also amends various sections related to school safety, including requiring the Center for School Safety to certify guardians, specifying certifications for school resource officers, and allowing districts to hire guardians until certified officers are available. It requires trauma-informed teams to compile activities for school improvement plans and mandates the Department of Education to gather data on mental health professionals in schools. Additionally, it requires schools to provide suicide prevention awareness twice a year, allows secondary locking mechanisms in schools, and creates a School Mapping Data Program administered by the Center for School Safety. Finally, it requires school districts to maintain and update school mapping data and makes various conforming changes.

Hunting and Fishing Licenses (Williams, R-Verona): SB 5 removes the requirement for resident owners of farmlands to own five or more acres of land to be exempt from sport hunting and fishing license requirements on their own farmlands.

Momnibus (Funke Frommeyer, R-Alexandria): SB 74 is designed to support maternal and infant health and address Kentucky's high maternal mortality rate. The bill requires most health plans to cover pregnancy, childbirth, postpartum care, and in-home treatment for substance use disorder. Additionally, it mandates coverage for labor and delivery costs, breastfeeding-related services, and supplies. Initially facing uncertainty, the legislation was attached to Senate Bill 74, bill was originally HB 10 (Moser, R-Taylor Mill.)



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LEGISLATION PASSED

A wide array of bills were passed this legislative session. These new laws will take effect July 1 or upon signage if it had an emergency clause.

The following pieces of legislation offer a glimpse into the diverse topics debated between the two chambers:

Aerospace Industry (Storm, R-London): Senate Bill 127 seeks to support Kentucky's aerospace and aviation industries by fostering public-private partnerships and enhancing workforce development across the state.

Adoption Records (Blanton, R-Salyersville): House Bill 87 will allow some family members to inspect adoption records if they are related to someone who was adopted or to the birth parents who gave up a child for adoption. The records can only be inspected after both birth parents or the adoptee have passed away.

Animal Abuse (Witten, R-Louisville): House Bill 258 seeks to strengthen state laws against torturing dogs or cats. It includes stiffer penalties for first-time offenders, who could face a class D felony rather than a misdemeanor charge under the bill.

Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) Program (Bray, R-Mount Vernon): HB 267 establishes the Kentucky BEAD Grant Program to fund broadband expansion in unserved and underserved areas. The Office will manage the BEAD funds, prioritize last-mile service delivery, and ensure compliance with federal guidelines.

Civics Education (Duvall, R-Bowling Green): House Bill 535 calls on the Kentucky Board of Education to create academic standards for civic literacy in high schools. That includes lessons on America's founding, the U.S. Constitution, principles of government and civil liberties, among others.



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LEGISLATION PASSED

Consumer Data Protection (Branscum, R-Russell Springs): House Bill 15 establishes new privacy protections for digital consumers. It will allow consumers to review and correct any data that companies collect on them. Consumers can also refuse to have their data sold and can demand that their data is deleted under the bill.

Emissions Standards (Carpenter, R-Berea): Senate Bill 215 forbids state agencies from adopting or enforcing California's emission standards on motor vehicles.

Horse Racing Commission (Thayer, R-Georgetown): Senate Bill 299 will revamp the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission to create a fully independent agency called the Kentucky Horse Racing and Gaming Corporation. In addition, the bill will dissolve the state Department of Charitable Gaming next year and place oversight of charitable gaming under the new corporation.

Kentucky Product Development Initiative (Bowling, R-Middlesboro): HB13 establishes the Kentucky Product Development Initiative, providing grants to local governments and economic development authorities for projects aimed at economic growth. Grants require local matching funds based on county population rankings and are capped at \$2 million per county.

Legislative Vacancies (Rudy, R-Paducah): Under House Bill 622, vacant seats in the U.S. Senate will be filled through a special election rather than an appointment by the governor. The winner of the election will serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Local Housing Ordinances (Dotson, R-Winchester): House Bill 18 prevents local governments from requiring property owners to accept tenants who use federal housing assistance.



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LEGISLATION PASSED

Medicinal Cannabis (Nemes, R-Louisville): House Bill 829 seeks to update some aspects of Kentucky's upcoming medicinal cannabis program. It would allow schools to opt out and allow local governments to apply a small fee to the program, among other changes.

Non-Citizen Voting (Howell, R-Murray): Senate Bill 143 proposes changes to the state constitution that would prevent anyone who is not a U.S. citizen from voting in Kentucky elections. Proposed amendments do not go to the governor for a signature, but still need ratification by Kentucky voters in an election before taking effect.

Nuclear Energy (Carroll, R-Benton): Senate Bill 198 establishes the Kentucky Nuclear Energy Development Authority to support and facilitate the development of a nuclear energy ecosystem across the state.

Veteran Suicide Prevention (Meredith, R-Oakland): Under House Bill 30, the Kentucky Department of Veterans Affairs will create a suicide prevention program for service members, veterans, and their families.

Youth Employment Programs (Givens, R-Greensburg): Senate Bill 128 allows non-profit organizations to employ 12- and 13-year-olds for the purpose of learning life and employment skills. To participate, organizations would need to first receive approval from the state Department of Workplace Standards, and the work could not exceed 18 hours a week.



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BUDGET

The FY25-FY26 executive branch budget, represented by House Bill 6 (sponsored by Rep. Jason Petrie), allocates **\$131.7 billion** to fund critical items, maintaining various provisions from the previous state budget (FY23-FY24).

HB 6 took effect with an emergency clause on April 19, 2024.
